As we move through these fifty days after Easter toward the feast of Pentecost, we are continuing to celebrate the Paschal Mystery: God's love and salvation revealed to us through the life, passion, death, and resurrection and glorification of his Son, Jesus Christ. Through his death on the cross, the defining moment, the defining event, the unveiling of his love, the ultimate expression of his love, Jesus demonstrated his total union with the Father and his total love for us. And since the Holy Spirit is the love between the Father and the Son, it was the pinnacle of the Spirit's presence in Jesus. Jesus now had a Spirit permeated existence which transformed him.

This leads to Pentecost, Jesus giving us the Gift of his love, the Spirit permeated existence, the Holy Spirit poured out on us. Pentecost, then is the fulfillment of the entire Paschal Mystery, our redemption fulfilled wherein God has held nothing back. "All that is mine is yours." (Jn 17:10). He unveiled himself to us in the Paschal Mystery, lavishing us with the Holy Spirit, the God of Love. He has shown us the way to a new life. We live in a "new and different way." (Rom 7:6), infinitely surpassing what our own efforts could possibly accomplish. Pentecost is the great feast of our Triune God's intimacy with us. Pentecost is the birth of the Church. See St. Luke, The Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 2:1-40.

An understanding of the Paschal Mystery may help us understand our faith similarities. Since nearly its inception, the Columbus Cursillo and now the Catholic Cum Christo has welcomed believers of various main-stream Protestant faiths to participate in the Cum Christo Weekend and even engaged them in leadership roles. This outreach and inclusion has over the years been a gracious attempt to help unite us in our similarities rather than separate us in our differences. If you understand and believe in the meaning and fullness of the Paschal Mystery, what Jesus has done for all of us, that we have in common among our faiths.

Relatedly, ecumenism in Cum Christo, although not essential to the Cum Christo Movement, through our historical origins, brings us together to share the blessings of the Paschal Mystery. We set example to each other of living out the Paschal Mystery.

A pastor tells of a time he was walking down the street eating some green grapes. As he passed a panhandler who asked him for some loose change, he thought, "Why don't you give this man your grapes?" Now the pastor was hungry and really enjoying the grapes. He really didn't want to give them up. They tasted so good. He thought, "Lord, I'm really enjoying these grapes, but if I'm supposed to give them to this man, then that's what I'll do." So he turned around, went back to the man, and asked, "Would you like these grapes?" Without hesitation, the man said, "Yes." The pastor handed them over and went on his way.

The pastor thought, "I wonder what that was all about." In other words, why did the Holy Spirit prompt me to do that? He concluded he didn't really need to know. He had served a fellow human being, and that's all that mattered.

More than several times in my life, I have let opportunities like that go by, and I now regret it. Some years ago, down at the Cursillo (Cum Christo) Center, I was out for a walk with a friend when a panhandler asking for "a dollar to buy some lunch" approached us. My friend gave him a dollar or two without hesitation, but I didn't, thinking, "This guy is just going to buy some booze." When I challenged my friend about giving him the money, he said, "What he does with the money I gave him is between him and God." I never forgot that statement.

On another occasion many years ago, I was washing my car when an elderly neighbor lady came by, upset that her husband, a strong farmhand, was in bed sick, and she needed a ride to the drugstore to buy some cough medicine. I thought "I'm too busy," and I referred her to see my wife inside. My loving and patient wife dropped whatever she was doing at the time, and took her into town. That night the lady's husband died. I never forgot my missed opportunity to help a fellow human being.

We are often prompted by the Holy Spirit to love others and to do good deeds. We need to be alert and "hear" these promptings. We are called to do what the Holy Spirit asks, even when it seems trivial, inconvenient, or embarrassing. We may never know what God's purpose is. We don't have to. Our duty is simply to obey, not to explain.

Our service to the Church and community as Cursillistas should flow from hearts filled with gratitude for all that God gives us. Blessings to you and yours

Relative to Cum Christo and Protestant/Catholic participation in the Cum Christo Weekend, we did a little data research to find out the percent participation of Catholic and Protestant candidates as well as team members over the last ten years. The data does not include Spiritual Directors.

What can we conclude from these data? As we analyze the data over the last ten years/20 Men's and 20 Women's Weekends, we see a steady participation of Protestants in both the Weekend candidates and the Weekend teams with some Weekends with greater and some with fewer Protestant participation. The same is true of Catholic participation.

Cum Christo is bringing candidates to Christ and developing leaders who are going out to serve and lead in their many environments. The Cum Christo Community has been doing a steady job of sponsoring both Protestant and Catholic candidates and of including Protestants on Weekend Teams. Will Protestant participation increase? Probably not. The data over ten years is steady. A ten year span is a long time. Do all of us need to continue to be serious about sponsoring candidates so our numbers do not decline? Obviously, yes!. We cannot slack off in sponsoring candidates for Jesus Christ.

Just as we all share in and celebrate the Paschal Mystery, so too, we share in and celebrate the Cum Christo Movement. Both help us keep the Movement alive and all of its parts in the proper perspective.

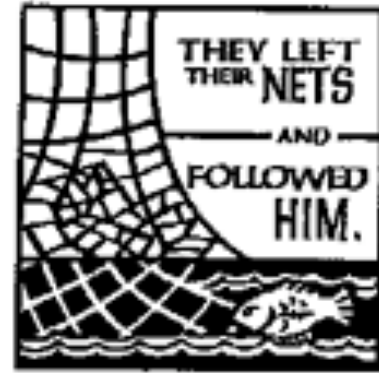

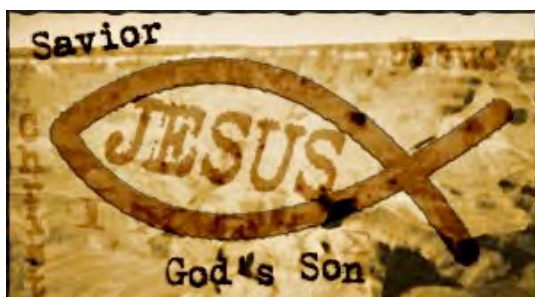


The Cum Christo Environment- Part 2

Have you thought about all of the environments in your life? The easy ones are home, work and church. You are in an environment now and you will be in a different one just by walking down the street. Have you ever just said hello to someone you passed on the street or just nodded and smiled at them? A smile or a hello may brighten someone's day. We touch many people each day in many different environments. We never know when our words or actions may have an affect on someone. Several years ago I passed a colleague in the hall at work and greeted him with a smile and a "Good Morning". He stopped me and said that he had noticed that I usually greeted everyone I met with a smile and a nod or hello. This gave me the opportunity to witness about my faith and we eventually started a bible study at work that continued for several years.

I now realized that I might not have shown enough of my "below the water line" to affect my former work environment for Christ.

Our Visit with Bishop Frederick Campbell

As we entered the Chancery Office, Bishop Campbell came out of a room into the hall and very graciously greeted us. He ushered us into a parlor insisting we relax on a couch rather than sit at a table.

After introductions and our brief life stories, we asked him for his impressions of Cum Christo. How did he perceive Cum Christo? He said he thought that, as a spiritual renewal movement in the Diocese, Cum Christo impressed him as truly serving the spiritual needs of many people who were called to make that kind of a spiritual renewal weekend; that Cum Christo was serving its purpose in the Diocese. He agreed that not everyone was meant to make a Cum Christo Weekend because that type of weekend doesn't fit everyone on their spiritual journey.

We discussed the history of Cum Christo and our past break from the National Cursillo, its causes and effects. He knew the canon law that prohibited the Diocese from financially supporting Cum Christo which, simply stated, says that a movement must be fully Catholic. We told him that we have applied to the finance office to be placed in the Diocesan Group Ruling.

If Cum Christo is not accepted, he commented that because we are not financially supported by the Diocese does not mean that he does not spiritually support Cum Christo. In other words, we are under his guidance and direction. We assured him that our By-Laws specifically state that "Cum Christo is a Catholic Lay Movement in the Diocese of Columbus under the auspices of the Bishop of Columbus".

We asked what he thought about the ecumenical aspect of Cum Christo. He was quite aware of our ecumenism. His first question was: How many Protestants participate in Cum Christo? We provided him with our recent data research which indicated thirty-three percent over the past ten years. He read over the information with interest.

He fully validated our no intercommunion policy which came up in our discussion of the weekend. He seemed pleased that we were strictly following that rule. We discussed candidate requirements for acceptance expressing to him the criteria for a candidate's acceptance: that the candidate be baptized and believe in the Nicene Creed, the Bible as the Word of God, and in the fulness of the Trinity. He questioned us on the belief of some Protestant churches in the Nicene Creed which seemed important to him.

We presented our Pastoral Outreach Program which he fully supported cautioning us to be aware that pastors have the freedom to make pastoral decisions and that not all would agree with us.

We asked if there were any personal needs or Diocesan needs that Cum Christo could fulfill. He didn't see how we could do any more than what we were already doing.

Part of our mission was to educate him on the current status of Cum Christo, so we provided him with our latest Quiri Quiri Newsletter, a list of the Cum Christo leaders on Secretariat and Leaders' School, an updated copy of which he was happy to receive, and the Pastoral and Sponsorship Brochures. We also provided him with the Cursillo *Fourth Day* Booklet which clearly presents the weekend, the talks and ecumenism among other things He was gracious in receiving our literature and showed interest in it. In glancing through the materials he found his quote in the Pastoral Brochure and commented that he remembered writing it about three years ago.

It was a delight to spend time with him and to recognize that he understands and supports the Cum Christo Movement. We asked if we could sponsor him on a Cum Christo Weekend and he smiled and responded that he was of the Cistercian model. We understood. We truly enjoyed our visit with him.

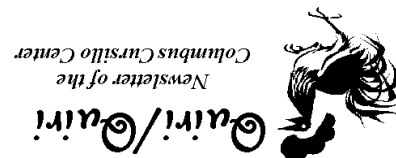
