Finding good candidates is one of the challenges we all face as members of Cum Christo. But, if you make a conscious effort to think about what makes good candidates and where do they come from, the challenges isn't all that difficult.

Potential candidates are all around us. They are among the people we meet in our everyday environment—family members, neighborhoods, churches and workplaces. When considering someone, ask yourself:

- Would he be a good leader?
- Is she representative of someone who would help bring others to His kingdom through Study, Piety and Action?

Take a good look around you. For example, when you're at bible study, the person next to you might be aware of Cum Christo but perhaps has never been invited.

The person from whom you received Eucharist or someone who greets you at the church door might be waiting for you to tell them about a weekend. At your workplace, there might be someone who would be interested in hearing about a short course in Christianity. What about your neighbor?

As in all that we do, pray first and then listen to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

Recently a new babe chick in our parish "stepped out" and asked our pastor to say a few words about Cum Christo from the pulpit. Two or three Cursillistas were available after mass to answer questions and discuss weekend.

As a result, two agreed to attend the Men's 135th. Others expressed interest in future dates.

God's work isn't as difficult as you think. Make a friend. Be a friend. Bring a friend to Christ.

Sharing Suffering and Salvation

To celebrate the Passover, the Leaders School group, in March, conducted a portrayal of the Jewish Seder Meal at the First Congregational Church. Passover means deliverance. It is the great Jewish feast of Redemption and liberation—the memorial of the Israelite's deliverance from their bondage in Egypt.

In the story of Exodus, Yahweh passed over the houses of the children of Israel in Egypt. Passover is also known as the Feast of **Unleavened Bread**. In their haste to flee Egypt, "the people carried off their dough, still unleavened."

The **lamb** offered at each paschal meal recalls the first Passover sacrifice, whose blood protected the Israelites from the avenging angel of Yahweh.

The Passover Seder is also believed to be when Jesus instituted the **Eucharist**. When he took bread and broke it and gave it to them, saying "this is my body which will be given for; do this in memory of me."

He did the same with the cup after supper and, and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood which will be poured out for you."

Our Christian observance of this ritual meal celebrates not only our tradition of Christ's Last Supper but our own Jewish heritage through Jesus.

This year, 120 people attended the Seder Meal. They shared in the suffering and salvation of the Israelites through the Ten Plagues that Our Lord sent on Pharaoh and the Egyptian people to let his people go.

One of the most meaningful things for me on my weekend was being aware that many people were praying and sacrificing for me—people I did not know and quite possibly would never meet.

Another moving palanca for me was a mailman who was going to walk his route with a stone in his shoe for three days. And each time the stone would cause pain, he would pray for our weekend.

I beseech you during the next weekend to think about your palanca and make it as meaningful and powerful as possible.

A Tribute to the Beatitude Man

In the 20 years I've been actively involved in Cum Christo, I was privileged to know and serve with many of the leaders who represented the backbone of the movement in Columbus.

Several of them—who inspired me and served as a source of Christian strength—have entered their 5th day. Among them:

- Jim Flynn who could always be called on to serve in whatever area help was needed. In addition to serving as Rector, he headed up Leader's School and served as Lay Director twice.
- Darleen Eberly was a special friend who served as coordinator of the movement for many years. She was truly a servant/leader—warm, understanding, humble, gentle and wise.

In March, we lost another great leader when **Lou Calderone** entered his 5th day. Lou—one of the original leaders who helped bring Cursillo to Columbus. He traveled here from Cincinnati to conduct weekends and train new leaders, revise handout materials and handbooks. And he was responsible for so much more. Among his contributions:

- Instrumental in convincing the diocese to provide Holy Cross School to use as a center.
- Established Leaders School.
- Developed procedures requiring any one serving on a team to first attend Leaders School.
- Revised the focus of **Ultreya**.
- Initiated weekend experience at small parishes to find and inspire leaders to support the Cum Christo movement in outlying areas.

When National Cursillo rejected our membership because of our ecumenical model, Lou forged ahead with his leadership.

Through Lou's relationship with and support of Bishop Griffin, we became

"Cum Christo" without losing our identity and focus.

Lou gave much to our movement but what he really was about was **living the message** in his parish and in any environment in which he was involved. He was quiet, but effective.

For example, when I worked for as a social worker for Catholic Social Services, Lou appeared at the Holy Rosary Shelter for homeless mothers with young children and asked if any of the clients could use some old school desks that had been stored away and were not wanted by the new charter school.

I'll never forget the delight of those children as they carried their very own school desks and chairs back. These were families who had lost everything and most of the school-aged children were struggling in school as you can imagine. Now they had something of their very own to use for homework, which they couldn't wait to put to use. Simple gesture. Big impact.

Lou, who had a woodworking workshop at home, would often make things and give them to those of us working with him on Secretariat and Leaders School. It was his way of showing appreciation. He also hosted retreats and potlucks for us. His kindness even extended to us on an individual basis

At his funeral, Lou was eulogized as a **"Beatitude Man**."

He was modest, warm, kind, funny, sensitive, observant and—most of all—proactive. A strong and gentle man, he truly loved his God and always questioned himself to be sure he was doing God's work.

Lou Calderone was a true servant/leader in the best sense of the term and a role model to all who were privileged to know him. He will continue to influence environments by his example and his inspiration. Thank you Lord for sending him to us. Bless him and give him peace.
