Application Coordinator

In the role of application coordinator I process the incoming weekend applications. This role allows me an opportunity to provide a service to the community as well as another opportunity to pray. As I process each application I pray for the potential candidate and their sponsor. I pray that God be present in their lives and provide them what they need at this particular time in their life.

Cum Christo is one means of renewal within the church. The goal of the movement is the same as the goal of the church: to bring all to Christ. Cum Christo provides a vehicle for similarly committed Christians to support one another in achieving that goal. Cum Christo is counting on you as sponsors to prayerfully discern candidates for the weekend. While we believe the weekend would be a wonderful experience for an individual, without a solid Christian foundation and desire to grow in your faith and serve others it can be just another wonderful weekend. As you know from your own experience Cum Christo is not for everyone. Often there are things going on in a person's life, which could cause them not to be able to fully participate in the weekend and more importantly their 4th day.

When you are discerning candidates think about your own weekend and how you felt. What might have helped you when you were making the decision to attend a weekend? Put yourself in their shoes and prayerfully discern if they are ready. When you sit down with a potential candidate(s) be sure to explain the mission and method of Cum Christo.

Often I have to call a sponsor and ask them to call their candidate and talk to them about inter-communication because that area of the application was not completed This can be disruptive on a weekend if the candidate does not understand this aspect of Cum Christo. When a potential candidate is married it is always best to speak with both spouses about the weekend.

Be still, and know that I am God!” Psalm 46:10a

This is one of my favorite Bible verses but also one of the most difficult for me to follow. BE STILL! How can I do that? If God saw my calendar then there would be no question that I am “busy for the Lord.” Or am I just busy?

I have spent much time the past year thinking about all I do and trying to put some perspective on doing and being. You see God made us as human beings, not human doings so I have to rethink all my doing and begin some sense of being in the presence of God.

But I must confess it is very hard for me to sit silently and listen. The end result is usually that I fall asleep. But I’ve learned to give my rest over to God and be thankful because God can speak to us even in our sleep.

I also find that when I try to be still the cares of the world come down on me. Everything that I need to be doing, everything that I’ve neglected arises to take some space in my quietude. Another lesson for me has been to give all these things to God. They are important and if I give up on my quiet time and let the cares overtake me I have given in. Let them take their rightful place in your thoughts but don’t let them own you. Give them up and eventually you will find rest in God.

Further, this command to “be still” forces us to think on two things: that we are finite, and that God is infinite. We cannot know what the future holds but we can know who holds the future. This spiritual calm, that God commands, does not come from a lack of troubles; it derives from a steady, deep reflection on the ways God has intervened in history on behalf of his people.

So as your world is crumbling around you, the call from Scripture is: don’t flinch in faith in God. Stand still—not because of a self-made confidence, not because you are the most composed person in the face of disaster, not because “you’ve seen it all.” Be still because of what you know about God.

It is God’s past that provides calm for our future. Know that he is God! Know it, not merely intellectually, but practically, spiritually, and emotionally. He is your God. He is the ruler of kingdoms of this earth and the all-powerful Creator of the Universe.

Information is provided for social events like Ultreya Fest and volunteer opportunities such as “Christmas in July” etc. Hugs and Prayers help us to remember our community and those in need.

My thanks to Stacey Bergmann for all that she has done to keep the Quiri a vital part of our community. The format of the Quiri may be slightly different in the future since we are transitioning to a different computer program. As Stacey passes this task on to me, I promise to you, my brothers and sisters in Christ that that I will work hard to continue this tradition.

Begins promptly at 6 a.m. Please do not bring children. For those interested, breakfast at TeeJay's on Dublin Road will follow the serenade.

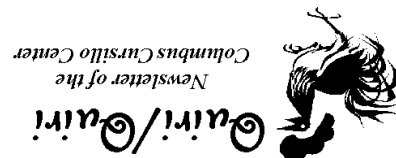
